- The 2<sup>nd</sup> Regular Session, 47<sup>th</sup> Legislature adjourned *sine die* at 12:12am on June 22<sup>nd</sup>.
- **Jennifer L. Martin** was appointed to the Game and Fish Commission by the Governor after the Senate failed to confirm her nomination. 6/22

H2129 (Chapter 238): GAME AND FISH; ENFORCEMENT; PENALTIES	The feeding of wildlife, except tree squirrels and birds, in counties with more than 280,000 people is prohibited and punishable by a fine of up to \$300. The maximum balance in the Wildlife Theft Prevention Fund (where fines for illegal taking of wildlife are deposited) is no longer limited to \$50,000 and minimum fine amount for violations are increased. Game and Fish may permanently revoke or suspend for a period of five years or more a person's hunting privileges for repeat violations, or the unlawful taking of trophy (defined) or endangered species.
