SOLICITATION FACTORS:

1. SCOPE

The purpose of this Request for Proposal (RFP) is to establish a contract for Bald Eagle Nestwatching Services for the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AGFD) in accordance with the requirements of the RFP.

- 1.1. Arizona supports a small and unique resident population of endangered bald eagles. The 56 known BAs in Arizona constitute the only population of desert nesting bald eagles in the United States.
- 1.2. To protect and study these nesting bald eagles, the Arizona Bald Eagle Nestwatch program was conceived in 1978. It began with a single volunteer assigned to a nest, and has since grown into a multi-agency program that is able to place teams of nestwatchers at ten to fifteen BAs each year.
